ocated in the Sea of Japan 40–80 km north of Shimane Peninsula, the Oki Islands are a collection of many small islets and four inhabited islands: Dōgo Island, Nishinoshima Island, Nakanoshima Island and Chiburijima Island. Designated as a Global Geopark in 2013, the islands became a UNESCO Global Geopark following recognition of the geoparks as an official UNESCO label in 2015. The region boasts a rich natural environment and is also part of the Daisen-Oki National Park.





What is a UNESCO Global Geopark?

NESCO Global Geopark is an official label of UNESCO and is awarded to places where sites and landscapes of international geological significance are managed with a holistic concept of protection, education and sustainable development. We hope our visitors will enjoy their time here to the fullest while cherishing the environment and minimising their ecological impact.

FUKUOKA

Ama Town (Nakanoshima Island)

Population: 2,300 Area: 33.44 km²

This town features the widest plain on the Dōzen Islands, which made rice farming possible on this otherwise quite hilly island. The island is historically known for being the place of exile of Emperor Go-Toba in the 13th century.

Nishinoshima Town (Nishinoshima Island)

This town boasts the unforgettable scenery of Kuniga Coast, a place of diverse coastal landforms, such as cliffs, caves, sea arches, and stacks. Exploring from the land and from the sea provides unique insights into the story of the land.

Chibu Village (Chiburijima Island)

Population: 620 Area: 13.7 km²

Chibu Village features a breathtaking 360° panorama of all Oki Islands, and is known for both its peaceful scenery of gentle mountain slopes dotted with cows grazing away on the grass, and the dynamic sheer cliff Sekiheki.

Remote Islands Retreat

As visitors step off the boat they are welcomed by the distinctly different atmosphere, a peaceful ambience and a feeling that time goes at a slower pace compared to the outside world.

Whether visitors are waking up at sunrise to see how the changing skies colour the scenery, staying at a small guesthouse to cook with local ingredients, or listening to the sound of the waves and small fishing boats passing by, there are numerous ways to experience the non-rushed, rural way of life.

Immerse Yourself in Nature

The Oki Islands were created through the joint powers of volcanic activity that took place six million years ago, and subsequent erosion by waves and winds over thousands of years.

The abundant natural resources are easy to notice even before stepping off the boat. As the ferry approaches the islands, complex coastlines, forest-covered mountains, gently sloping terrain, and numerous small islets come into view, instantly catching the visitor's eye.

A variety of activities, such as hiking, sea kayaking and cycling on e-bikes allow the visitor to connect with nature in a meaningful way through active tourism.

Uncover Local Stories and Traditions

The oldest proof of human presence on the Oki Islands dates back to 30,000 years ago. The culture of the islands stretches back to these ancient times, from the early Middle Ages when Oki became islands of remote exile, to the early modern period when the islands became an essential port of call for merchant ships in the 18th and 19th century.

This history has fostered a diverse and rich culture on the Oki Islands. Due to the geographical remoteness of the islands, vestiges of the past still linger in local traditions, rituals and festivals which have been preserved as a part of the daily lives of the island people.

They provide an important resource for peeking into the past of not only the Oki Islands, but also Japan, as many of the traditional dances or celebrations are already lost in other regions.

With more than 100 larger and smaller shrines and temples scattered across the islands, many hyperlocal and unique festivals are held each year. These small and non-commercialized events are a special treat for anyone seeking an exclusive, local experience.

ust like other regions in Japan, the Oki Islands have four seasons, each with its distinctive seasonal delicacies. The food culture is slightly different between the four islands, but common practice is that local people eat what is currently in season, leading a healthy life in rhythm with nature.

As expected, there is plenty of fish, shellfish and seaweed. Thanks to the flat terrain and abundant water springs, rice and Japanese sake are produced on the islands, too. Another delicacy is beef from wagyu cattle, raised without stress in the rich natural environment.



Rock Oysters · · · · · · · · · · · · · (Mar–Jun)

Nishinoshima Island was the first place in Japan to succeed in farming rock oysters. They are cultivated in waters rich in minerals, and harvested right when they are at their most delicious, from March through June. It takes at least three years before the oysters are ready to be put on the market and enjoyed raw, grilled or deep fried.

Sazae Turban Shell (Mar-Apr)



In Japan, sazae turban shells are in season in early summer, but in the Oki Islands they are abundant and can be enjoyed year-round. They have characteristic shells with spikes (which help them to not be swept away by waves). Sazae are caught by traditional fishing methods, such as diving and kanagi fishing, which uses a glass-bottomed wooden box (similar to an aquascope), and a long spear.



Rice farming is possible on the islands thanks to their rich water resources. Some brands employ original solutions, such as sprinkling the field with seaweed salt brine or using rock oyster shells as fertiliser. Around the time when the fields turn gold in colour and the rice is being sun-dried after the harvest, many families enjoy their first bowl of the new rice.



Squid fishing is flourishing in the Oki Islands, with various types of squid caught year-round. Special machines used for drying the squid can be spotted in the port areas. Swordtip squid, which is in season in summer and autumn, is especially beloved by the islanders due to its sweet taste and tender texture.

Oki Matsuba-gani (Oki Snow Crab) (Dec-Feb)



Oki Matsuba-gani (Oki Snow Crab) is a brand of crab carefully selected from snow crabs caught using baskets, a crabbing method which is rare in Japan. Crabs caught by this method experience less stress, preventing them from scratching each other. Crabs that weigh over 700 g are tagged with a blue tag, a proof of the brand.

Iwa-nori Wild Seaweed (Dec-Jan)



Iwa-nori is handpicked from rocky shores in the winter season and then dried into sheets of seaweed with a characteristic texture. It is crunchy and has a rich aroma, and is a staple in the traditional cuisine on the Oki Islands. Guests can find it in onigiri rice balls, sazae rice wrapped in wild seaweed, Oki soba noodles or a Japanese New Year's soup dish.

Rock Oyster Farming

he Oki Islands offer many outdoor activities for those interested in adventure tourism. Surrounded by exceptionally clear waters, the islands are a perfect place for marine activities such as sea kayaking and snorkelling. The rugged coastline and landscape formed by volcanic activities in the past offer impressive scenery for hiking and cycling. Cows and horses are kept on open pastures; sometimes they can be found grazing along the scenic hiking routes.

ACTIVITIES





This tour combines outdoor sports with environmental education and is highly recommended for those interested in environmental issues and sustainability. Participants trek down to the sea through untamed nature and work as a team to clean marine debris deposited on the coast. Participants will then go on an adventure in a packraft, paddling between the impressive Saburo-iwa Rocks, along the coast and then towards a small inlet. The tour concludes with a relaxing coffee and snack break by the sea.

Sea Kayaking Cave Tours

The Oki Islands were in large part created by volcanic activity and subsequent erosion caused by wind and waves. Sea kayaking is an easy way to access many beautiful views and marvel at the complex coastline. Highly transparent waters allow the visitors to observe marine animals, and give the illusion of gliding over the sea. Experienced instructors who are familiar with the site will not only show participants the sheer cliffs, caves and scenery of the coastline, but will also coach participants on safety and accompany them throughout the tour. Instructions in Japanese or simple English only, but international visitor friendly.

Hiking Tours

The Dōzen Islands are less mountainous than Dōgo Island. The hiking routes here feature panoramic views of the sea and the numerous islands of the archipelago. Some highlights include: hiking down from the clifftop to the coast through a vast green pasture at Kuniga Coast, visiting a shrine hidden on Mt. Takuhi, walking through small, cosy settlements on Chiburijima Island, and discovering how the unique terrain of the islands influenced the history and the daily lives of the local people.





GUIDED TOURS IN DŌGO ISLAND





One might imagine islands to offer views of coastal landscapes, but 500–600 m tall mountains and deep forests are popular hiking destinations in Okinoshima Town. There are five hiking routes with different levels of difficulty: Mt. Daimanji, Washigamine Ridge, Tokage-iwa (Lizard Rock), Mt. Takada, and Shirashima Coast. The tours' highlights include climbing the highest peak of the island from where a breathtaking scenery can be seen, walking through a natural forest of Japanese cedars and discovering the unique ecosystem of the Oki Islands. Guided Tour of Ama Town on E-bikes

One of the best ways to enjoy the dynamic scenery of the islands is joining a guided e-bike (electric-assisted mountain bikes) tour, where visitors can discover how the landscape is connected to the locals' daily lives. Guests can visit some of the major tourist spots (Akiya Coast, Oki Shrine, Uzuka-mikoto Shrine, Dōzen Caldera viewpoints) with a professional English-speaking guide. While on the road, the guide and tour participants communicate with each other using an intercom system. It is a great way to explore the island for experienced cyclists and beginners alike, as the e-bikes will assist the rider across the terrain.

Shichimi Seasoning Making Experience




Shichimi is a blend of spices and other seasoning ingredients, and is widely used in Japanese home cooking. Most of the ingredients provided in this activity—chilli peppers, *iwanori* and wakame seaweeds, Japanese pepper, ginger, *fukugi* spicebush and dried yuzu citrus—are grown and harvested on Chiburijima Island. Visitors can make their own special blend, bring it home with them and add a special Japanese twist to their home cooking!

DEEPEN YOUR KNOWLEDGE OF JAPANESE CULTURE

he Oki Islands, though small and remote, have played a significant role in Japanese history, and traces of that past can be found in the islands' culture.

It is said that in the past there were more than 300 shrines in Oki, and more than a hundred still stand today. The types of shrines found here demonstrate that the islands were once a very prosperous place. The most notable are the 16 shrines recorded in *Engishiki Jinmyōcho*, a list of important shrines compiled in the year 927. Four of them were given the high ranking of *myōjin taisha*—shrines dedicated to important deities. Ancient mythology also suggests the significance of the islands, as according to the creation myth of the Japanese archipelago, the land of Oki was created third, after Awajishima and Shikoku.

With the huge number of shrines in the Oki Islands, there are countless festivals

and observances, just like the rest of the country. However, the ones here on the islands are not quite the same. All four of the inhabited islands have their own personality and unique cultural identities.

In addition to grand summer festivals with firework displays, and dance parades where anyone can jump in and join, there are also practises observed only by particular local communities, and festivals that were introduced to the islands by exiles or sailors of the trading ships docking at local ports. These traditions have been passed down through generations of islanders to become an invaluable part of the local culture.

By visiting this small archipelago, visitors can discover important episodes of Japanese history and experience unique traditions, a special treat for connoisseurs of Japanese culture.



Oki Islands Geopark Museum

This museum is located at Saigō Port, the gateway to Okinoshima Town. Here, visitors can learn more about the nature, culture and history of the Oki Islands. We strongly recommend visiting this facility before starting your island journey to grasp some basic knowledge of the islands, or after the adventure as a review of the information gathered during the trip. Descriptions are available in both English and Japanese.





Visit unique local shrines

Yurahime Shrine, one of the Oki Islands' most important shrines, is surrounded by many local tales and legends and is a popular destination for many visitors. Carvings of squid decorate the shrine building and lanterns. Takuhi Shrine, dedicated to a deity of sea voyage, holds a special place among the many shrines of the Dōzen area, which in the past served as port of call for merchant ships. Its building is partially hidden inside a cave, a sight not to be missed for culture enthusiasts.

Dangyō-no-taki Waterfalls, hidden deep in the forest, are two waterfalls which flow down from a 40-metre-tall cliff and fall on both sides of Dangyō Shrine. The path to them leads through a Japanese cedar forest, with a stream quietly flowing nearby.

Nagu-saki Cape commands a sweeping view of the sea and the Dōzen Islands in the distance. Next to the observation deck stands the nostalgic old lantern that acted as a lighthouse the people of the Nagu area used to light every day.

Have lunch in the Tsuma area.

This tour will take the visitors along scenic coasts and inside sea caves for an exciting experience.





(17) Saigō Port Guided Tour

Take a walk with an English-speaking guide through the narrow streets of the small fishing town and listen to the stories about local culture and history.

10:00-11:45

Rent a car or bicycle and explore the island (Saigō area).

Tamawakasu-mikoto Shrine is the Oki Islands' main general shrine. The main hall of the shrine was built in 1793 in the local Oki-zukuri style of architecture. Next to the shrine stands the massive Yao-sugi Japanese Cedar, which is said to be around 2,000 years old and is designated a Natural Monument of Japan.

Saigō-misaki Lighthouse is located on a cape overlooking the entrance to the main port of Okinoshima Town. The 100+ year old lighthouse is pure white and provides a striking contrast with the blue sea. Arrive around 11 am to catch the sight of the 11:20 ferry arriving at the port.

*Saigō-misaki Lighthouse is slightly too far to visit on a bicycle within this time frame.

18 Have Oki Soba noodles for lunch in the port area.

13:00 - 14:00

19 Visit the Oki Islands Geopark Museum and the Visitor Center.

Relax in the rest area in the Geopark Visitor Center, shop for locally made souvenirs in Anki-ichi Market (2 min on foot from the port) or in the souvenir shop inside the ferry terminal.

15:10 — Travel by ferry from Saigō Port in Okinoshima Town to Shichirui Port (Shimane Prefecture).

COVID-19 PREVENTION MEASURES AND ADVICE FOR HOLIDAYS ON THE OKI ISLANDS

nlike the densely populated cities, the Oki Islands are sparsely populated but infection prevention measures are taken seriously on the islands. There are only a few clinics, two hospitals and an ageing population. The islands will also continue to work on preventive measures in accordance with the guidelines listed by the Shimane Prefectural Government. We would also like to ask our visitors to follow the requests outlined in "Shimane Prefectural Government Response," which is available on the website of Shimane Prefecture.



Face masks

Face masks were frequently worn in Japan, especially in winter and spring, even before the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, face masks are not something newly introduced into Japanese society and the population are quite used to wearing them. According to the new guidelines released by the Government of Japan, starting from 13 March 2023, the use of masks will depend on personal choices. There are a few situations, such as displaying symptoms of the disease or when in crowded spaces such as transport, where wearing a face mask is recommended.





Hand sanitisers, thermometers and signs

- Hand sanitisers and thermometers are installed at various facilities, including the ferries. Visitors are encouraged to sanitise their hands thoroughly upon entering and exiting facilities, and transport.
- Signs that promote everyday protective measures are put up in various locations.



Food and drink establishments

- Some food and drink establishments may reduce their number of seats so their customers can maintain social distance when they are enjoying their meals.
- Tables at food and drink establishments are cleaned and disinfected frequently.
- Doors and windows are opened from time to time to increase the circulation of outdoor air and improve ventilation.
- Additional restrictions may be in place. Advanced booking is highly recommended.







"Three Cs" and travelling

- Some shops and other establishments may ask their customers to wear a face mask when using the facilities.
- Visitors should avoid visiting closed spaces with poor ventilation, crowded places with many people nearby and close-contact settings such as close-range conversation.
- Visitors should also refrain from travelling if they have symptoms such as fever or a cough.
